Dear Professor Bucklin:

This letter is in support of the nomination of James Graaskamp, Assistant Professor of Commerce, for a Kiekhofer or Steiger Award. Professor Graaskamp is 32 years of age; he was granted the Ph.D. degree by the University of Wisconsin in 1964 with risk management and insurance as his major field and real estate as the secondary field. His teaching experience began as a graduate student in 1958-59 and has been divided between insurance and real estate subjects. During several years in close working relationships with Professor Graaskamp, we have had ample opportunity to observe his accomplishments as a scholar and as a teacher of unusual effectiveness. One of the most convincing tests of fine teaching is continued student popularity in the face of demanding class assignments and insistence on high standards of student performance. He fully meets this test; he shows a talent for engendering student interest and enthusiasm in working out challenging management problems of high educational value; in short, he works his students hard and they like it. His courses are popular and he undoubtedly stands near the top in the informal student rating system.

Like all fine teachers, Graaskamp prepares for class with a thoroughness which reflects his deep interest in the subject and his sense of responsibility to his students. He presents his lectures and leads class discussion with vigor and enthusiasm. He makes effective use of modern devices of visual presentation. He has a talent for vitalizing theory by relating it to actual business or industry situations. His scholarship is not only sound but is remarkably versatile as well. During the last four years he has been called upon to develop several new courses and in total, has taught 6 different courses in urban land economics and real estate and 3 in risk management and insurance. His cheerful willingness to fill in wherever needed has been a joy to his colleagues and to his Dean and convincing testimony to his dedication to the teaching profession.

Graaskamp's personal rapport with students is exceptional. He takes a genuine interest in each individual; with nationce and wisdom, he counsels with them on both personal and academic problems. His office is crowded with students much of the day and his home is a meeting place for both formal and informal student groups. His leadership and enthusiasm have revived the moribund student club in the real estate field and converted it to a vital and going concern. His leadership has more than doubled membership in the student Risk-Management Club in the past two years. Although confined to a wheel chair,

Professor Graaskamp makes several out-of-town trips each year with these groups; perhaps the greatest student tribute to his leadership is the fact that the students do not in any way regard him as a handicapped person.

The talents of the nominee are not narrowly focused nor one-sided. His teaching effectiveness is outstanding for he loves to teach and grasps every opportunity to do so. But his effectiveness in public serivce activities deserves a high rating as well. He is well-acquainted with business leaders in his field and with public agencies; he is in demand as a speaker. His intellectual capacity for productive and original scholarship was demonstrated in his doctoral thesis. Though he has been carrying an unusually heavy teaching load, he has given ample evidence of an imaginative and creative mind and is at work on a research project to be published by the Bureau of Business Research Service and on an article to appear in the professional quarterly, The Appraisal Journal.

In summary, we strongly recommend Professor James Graaskamp for the Kiekhofer or Steiger Award as a scholar of high potential for original work, as an effective representative of the University of Wisconsin in public service activities, but most particularly, as a talented young teacher whose scholarship, enthusiasm, teaching technique and warm personality place him in the top rank among all of the many University teachers whom we have been privileged to observe over many years of academic experience.



Dear Mr. Badesch:

I would like to nominate Professor James A. Graaskamp of the University of Wisconsin-Madison School of Business as a Handicapped Citizen of the Year.

Professor Graaskamp is a quadriplegic who has been confined to a wheelchair since 1950 when he was stricken with polio at age 17. He resumed his education a year later, finished high school, and went on to earn a bachelor's degree from Rollins College in Florida, a master's degree from Marquette University, and a Ph.D. degree in 1964 from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he has taught since 1958.

He is an exceptional teacher, both in the classroom and outside. He was awarded the prestigious William H. Kiekhofer Teaching Award in 1966 on the nomination of his colleagues, who cited him as "a gifted teacher who presents his subject with splendid clarity and color" and as a scholar who relates theory to actual business situations. The teaching award citation called attention to his rapport with students: "Each individual commands his genuine interest. With patience and wisdom he counsels all on both personal and academic problems. His home and his office are meeting places for students, informal centers where learning and fine human relations are together advanced." Professor Graaskamp teaches courses in urban land economics, real estate, risk management, and insurance. He has stated that "good teaching requires enthusiasm, sensitivity to each student, and the leadership to drive students well beyond accepted workload norms. Today's students respond magnificently to that type of teaching."

Professor Graaskamp has also worked tirelessly to assist handicapped people to gain access to the university's programs through the removal of educational and architectural barriers. He and a student did the initial survey of the campus which identified all the architectural barriers to be overcome, and suggested means to correct the problems they found. He served as chairman of the Committee for Disabled Persons which established the McBurney Center for Persons With Disabilities, which provides a broad array of services for people with all types of handicapping conditions.

He was instrumental in the committee's adoption of grievance procedures for disabled students, which utilize a subcommittee of disabled persons as a grievance board for non-academic grievances.

Community service efforts of Professor Graaskamp include the counseling of small business firms, advising on city insurance problems and industrial land use, and developing and providing a computerized property appraisal system to Wisconsin communities to help them in solving tax assessment problems.

In 1970 he was named Wisconsin's Handicapped Person of the Year by the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped.

I enthusiastically endorse Professor James Graaskamp for Region V Handicapped Citizen of the Year. To again quote the Kiekhofer teaching award citation, he has "a remarkable zest for life on whatever terms meted out...an inspiration to the youthful minds he reaches toward and shapes."

Relative to your memo of February 15, 1985, I would like to nominate Prof. James A. Graaskamp for consideration as a result of his unique and outstanding service record. Review of his five year career resume (attached) as well as his 1985 resume will support the contention that he has excelled in each of the dimensions listed in your memo:

- 1. Teaching winner of the Keikhofer award in 1967. His course evaluations remain high despite increasing enrollments. His 550 Real Estate Process course is a classic and the only Business School course recommended in the Kaufman list (attached).
- 2. Teaching and public service to the industry is evidenced by the number of days of continuing education he is asked to provide throughout the United States as well as on his recent tour of the Pacific rim.
- 3. His research for industry is innovative and often unrecognized because it remains a proprietary interest of the clients at Landmark Research, Inc. He is nationally known as an expert witness in complex valuation litigation.
- 4. His record of public service includes five years as a board member and treasurer of the Wisconsin Housing Finance Agency, Chairman of the University 504 Committee for many years, numerous city and county committees, and continued involvement in the McBurney Resource Center for handicapped students.

SUBJECT: Nomination for Erwin A. Gaumnitz Distinguished Faculty Award

Tasteless as it may seem, I would like to nominate myself for consideration for the Gaumnitz Award since none of my colleagues know very much about what I am doing.

Attached to this memo is a short form of my resume and my current faculty report for 1987. All my teaching and research efforts have already been recognized (such as the Larson Award in 1985, the Lambda Alpha Award and my perennial position on "Kauffman's List of Bellringer Professors!"). My record to industry, community and university may be less well known.

My record of public service to the appraisal industry has been acknowledged by The Society of Real Estate Appraisers in 1986 who presented me with the Alfred E. Reinman, Jr. Award, their highest award, presented to only four others in their long history. In 1987 The American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers presented me with their comparable award, known as the Charles B. Shattuck Memorial Award. I'm the only individual to have won both. I am also a trustee of the prestigious Urban Land Institute, whose letterhead is enclosed because you will recognize many of the <u>dramata personnae</u> in real estate development. Selection for the Salomon Brothers Advisory Board is a significant national recognition.

In the Madison community I have been recognized by <u>Madison Magazine</u> as one of the 50 most influential citizens in their November, 1987 issue and our planning firm has had a significant impact on such issues as the location and necessity of the Convocation Center, redevelopment of the railroad corridors, the convention center location, and real estate problems of several of the nonprofit groups in Madison. The amount of press coverage given our various roles in these matters is an indication of community involvement.

Relative to the university and the School of Business, I have been responsible for raising more than \$600,000 of endowment in relatively small contributions from several hundred supporters. In addition, the Alumni from the School of

Business Real Estate Program have organized their own association with more than 900 members, which is a statement about how they value their education and the concern of the university for them while they were on campus. Certainly the Real Estate Department has become the top program in the country, particularly the Masters program, and the evidence can be found in the School of Business Placement Office in terms of its records as to frequency of inquiry for real estate graduates, placement success ratios, and average starting salaries.

As a result of the national recognition of the School of Business Real Estate Program, the school has been able to capture the National School of Real Estate Finance for the American Bankers' Association from Ohio State University and the School of Real Estate Development for the Urban Land Institute.

I believe these activities meet the criteria for the Gaumnitz Award in terms of "excellence in at least two of the above dimensions."
