


This is the new international symbol of wheelchair accessibility.

It is now being used by the State Highway Commission to mark all accessible rest areas along state trunk and interstate highways.

Watch for it also, at the entrances of public and private buildings throughout the Milwaukee area which are free of architectural barriers.

These are the barriers which bar the handicapped:

- (1) Street curbs, steps and flights of stairs
- (2) Heavy or revolving doors
- (3) Narrow doorways and raised thresholds
- (4) Inaccessible rest rooms
- (5) Out-of-reach drinking fountains and telephones
- (6) Parking too distant
